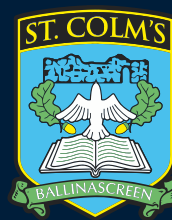

Dear Students, Parents and Guardians,

You are very welcome to St. Colm's High School and thank you for your interest in joining our school community.

St. Colm's has a long history of providing outstanding educational experiences for the young people in the local area. St. Colm's has an outstanding staff; our teachers and our support staff work tirelessly to ensure all in our care fulfil their potential. We have high expectations of our young people and craft a curricular and extra-curricular programme that both extends and supports them.

Our Cornstore Youth Club works closely with Ballinascreen Community Forum to ensure we contribute to the planning and execution of community celebrations such as the Christmas Lights event, the Teddy Bears' Picnic and Ballinascreen in Bloom.

We also continue to prepare our students for life beyond school. In partnership with Workspace, our **Careers ConneXtions event** provided students with invaluable insights into career pathways, apprenticeships, and higher education opportunities. This initiative reflects our commitment to ensuring every student is equipped to make informed choices about their future.

Sporting achievements also abound. In 2024–2025, we celebrated three Ulster titles: our U13 soccer team won the Northern Ireland Small Schools Cup final for the first time, our U14 hurlers claimed the Brother Mallon Shield, and our U14 camogie team won the Ulster Sciath Aoife title. These victories reflect the dedication and talent of our students and staff.

Academically, we continue to outperform non-selective schools across Northern Ireland. In 2025, 92% of all GCSE subjects studied at St. Colm's were above the Northern Irish average, with seven subjects achieving a 100% pass rate at grades A*–C. Our students' achievements in English and Maths were nearly 20% and 30% above the NI average respectively – a testament to their hard work and the excellence of our teaching staff.

We are proud of the wonderful young people in our school and are grateful to the community for entrusting them to us for their education. The ETI rightly reflected this in their report:

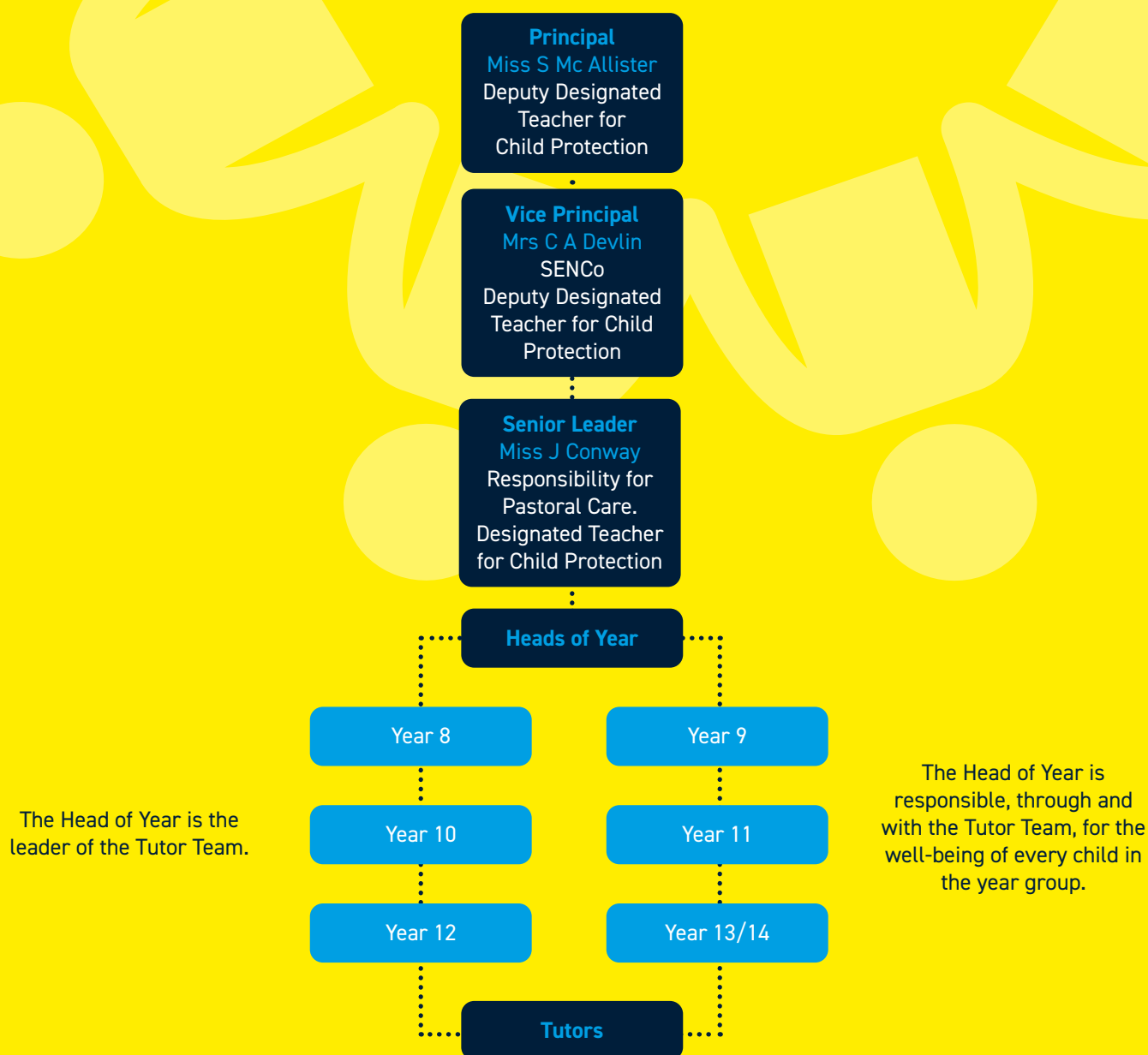
The school year begins with the celebration of Harvest Mass when we unite as a community.

OUR PASTORAL CARE PROGRAMME

The aim of Pastoral Care is to support, encourage and develop all pupils as individuals, as young people and as students.

Every teacher is responsible for Pastoral Care in every class. It is Pastoral Care policy that all pupils have continuous points of reference (i.e. Tutor & Head of Year) for advice, encouragement and trust over their years at school.

ST. COLM'S PASTORAL CARE



The personal and social development of every child —

The student's whole experience of school should continually contribute to their personal and social development. However, the relationships between pupil and Tutor and between pupil and Head of Year are especially important. Each Tutor is responsible for their tutor group under the guidance of the Head of Year.

The academic progress of every child —

It is the Head of Year's responsibility, through the Year Team, to ensure that each child is learning as effectively as possible. Subject teachers scrutinise the results of each assessment and keep the Tutor and Head of Year informed of academic achievement. They praise those doing well, assist those who are under-achieving and set targets for improvement.

Drugs education —

The school's programme aims to educate children about prevention and protection around drugs.

Relationships and Sexuality education —

This programme is delivered through Religious Education, Learning for Life and Work, Home Economics, Pastoral Care, Science and P.E. As a Catholic school we ensure that all issues are placed in a Christian and Catholic framework.

The extra curricular provision for the year group as a whole —

Extra curricular activities are an essential part of a good school. The Head of Year encourages extra curricular activities in the year group.

Cara system —

Every Year 8 pupil is given a special friend or 'Cara' from Year 12. This helps each pupil to settle in quickly and provides a feeling of security during this time of transition.



ANTI-BULLYING

We believe that every child has the right to be free from intimidation of any kind and that every child has the duty to respect each person's property, time and point of view.

Our Staff Will —

- Foster in our pupils, self esteem, self respect and respect for others.
- Demonstrate by example the high standards of personal and social behaviour we expect of our pupils.
- Discuss bullying with all classes, so that every pupil learns about the damage it causes to both the child who is bullied and the bully. They will also learn the importance of telling a trusted adult when it happens.
- Be alert to signs of distress and other possible indications of bullying.
- Listen to children who have been bullied, take what they say seriously and act to support and protect them.
- Report suspected cases of bullying to the Head of Year.
- Follow up any complaint by a parent about bullying and report back promptly and fully on the action taken.
- Deal with observed instances of bullying promptly and effectively; in accordance with agreed procedures.

POSITIVE BEHAVIOUR

All aspects of discipline are in the context of pastoral care. Staff, pupils, parents and governors are consulted on the main principles of positive behaviour. Pupils learn in a secure, happy and industrious environment, conducive to effective learning and personal development.

The school expects the highest possible standards in the following areas:

- Uniform, punctuality, attendance, homework
- Co-operation in the classroom, and around the school grounds
- Self-respect and respect for others
- Participation in school events
- Order in the corridors, playgrounds, canteen, coming to and going home from school
- Respect for school and other people's property

Our school policy is to seek to be positive. Staff will endeavour to use every opportunity to encourage and praise the achievements of all pupils.

There were key moments during school where guidance from staff really helped shape my path. 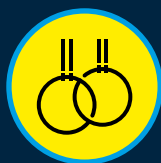

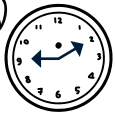


I'm in Year 8 in **St. Colm's High School**. I love it here, so I thought I would tell you about my day.

This is one of the many new subjects. It means Learning for Life and Work. We study all sorts of things including learning more about ourselves, our health and how to stay well.

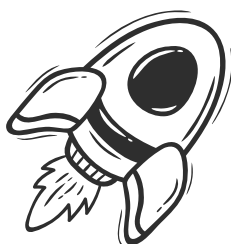
Period 6: Maths

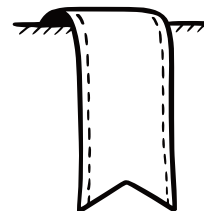

- Planting 9,724 bulbs in a stunning hot-air balloon display at Fair Hill

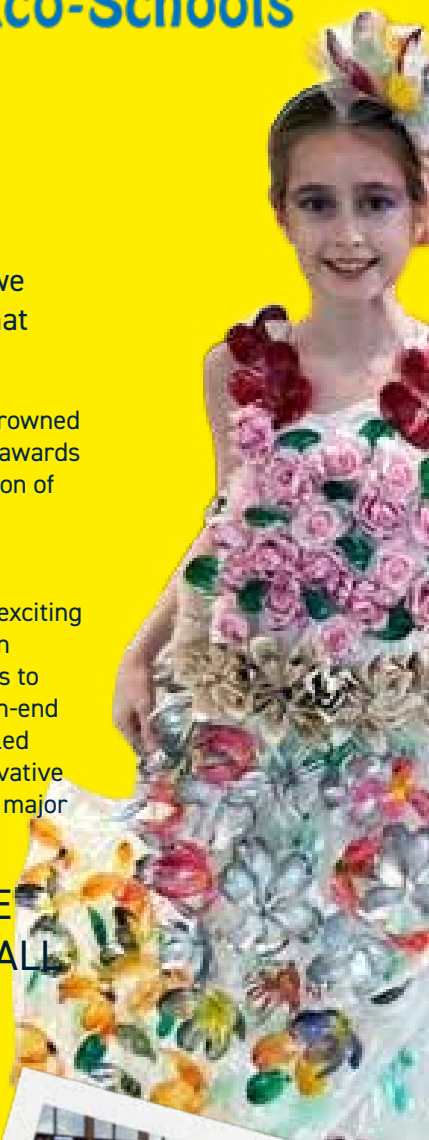
Our efforts didn't go unnoticed! We were thrilled to win the Community Eco Award at the Mid Ulster Arts, Culture, and Community Awards, and
