

# OUR PASTORAL CARE PROGRAMME

The aim of Pastoral Care is to support, encourage and develop all pupils as individuals, as young people and as students.

Every teacher is responsible for Pastoral Care in every class. It is Pastoral Care policy that all pupils have continuous points of reference (i.e. Tutor & Head of Year) for advice, encouragement and trust over their years at school.



The Head of Year is the

leader of the Tutor Team.

### The personal and social development of every child —

The student's whole experience of school should continually contribute to their personal and social development. However, the relationships between pupil and Tutor and between pupil and Head of Year are especially important. Each Tutor is responsible for their tutor group under the guidance of the Head of Year.

### The academic progress of every child —

It is the Head of Year's responsibility, through the Year Team, to ensure that each child is learning as effectively as possible. Subject teachers scrutinise the results of each monthly assessment and keep the Tutor and Head of Year informed of academic achievement. They praise those doing well, assist those who are under-achieving and set targets for improvement.

### Drugs education —

The school's programme aims to educate children about prevention and protection around drugs.

### Relationships and Sexuality education —

This programme is delivered through Religious Education, Learning for Life and Work, Home Economics, Pastoral Care, Science and P.E. As a Catholic school we ensure that all issues are placed in a Christian and Catholic framework.



# YOU ARE IN SAFE HANDS AT ST. COLM'S

### The extra curricular provision for the year group as a whole —

Extra curricular activities are an essential part of a good school. The Head of Year encourages extra curricular activities in the year group.

### Cara system —

Every Year 8 pupil is given a special friend or 'Cara' from Year 12. This helps each pupil to settle in quickly and provides a feeling of security during this time of transition.



### **ANTI-BULLYING**

We believe that every child has the right to be free from intimidation of any kind and that every child has the duty to respect each person's property, time and point of view.

### Our Staff Will -

- Foster in our pupils, self esteem, self respect and respect for others.
- Demonstrate by example the high standards of personal and social behaviour we expect of our pupils.
- Discuss bullying with all classes, so that every pupil learns about the damage it causes to both the child who is bullied and the bully. They will also learn the importance of telling a trusted adult when it happens.
- Be alert to signs of distress and other possible indications of bullying.
- Listen to children who have been bullied, take what they say seriously and act to support and protect them.
- Report suspected cases of bullying to the Head of Year.
- Follow up any complaint by a parent about bullying and report back promptly and fully on the action taken.
- Deal with observed instances of bullying promptly and effectively; in accordance with agreed procedures.

### POSITIVE BEHAVIOUR

All aspects of discipline are in the context of pastoral care. Staff, pupils, parents and governors are consulted on the main principles of positive behaviour. Pupils learn in a secure, happy and industrious environment, conducive to effective learning and personal development.

The school expects the highest possible standards in the following areas:

- Uniform, punctuality, attendance, homework
- Co-operation in the classroom, and around the school grounds
- Self-respect and respect for others
- Participation in school events
- Order in the corridors, playgrounds, canteen, coming to and going home from school
- Respect for school and other people's property

Our school policy is to seek to be positive. Staff will endeavour to use every opportunity to encourage and praise the achievements of all pupils.

- There are monthly and annual awards for excellent attendance
- Heads of Year will seek out opportunities to celebrate success in their year group.
   Evidence of this will be displayed on success boards
- Positive comments, when appropriate, will be written in the Student Planner and in pupil workbooks
- We seek every opportunity to acknowledge and publicise the achievements of our pupils in school, in the local and national press
- We seek to involve all our pupils in all aspects of school life
- We are especially interested in targeting underachievement through our mentoring scheme
- We operate an incentive reward system for KS3 and KS4

Our Post-16 students have the exciting opportunity to ski! This is a once in a lifetime opportunity and it is where lasting memories are made. Students ski, fall over, slide on donuts, fall over, eat pizza and quite often... fall over! It is a wonderful trip, one that many spend their school years dreaming of.



History students are offered the opportunity to travel to Poland, see around Krakow and visit Auschwitz. It is an extremely busy trip where you are guaranteed to hit your 10,000 steps! We are blessed to have international links with schools in Europe, including Spain. We have welcomed Spanish students to Ballinascreen and shown them South Derry hospitality. Our sights are now set on walking the Camino de Santiago (the way of St. James) a walking pilgrimage leading to the shrine of the apostle James in the cathedral of Santiago de Campostela in Galicia, northwestern Spain. This pilgrimage ensures our faith is practised, made real and grounds students in our key values of FAITH, RESPECT, RESPONSIBILITY and COMMUNITY.

This is one of my favourites! We are going swimming this term. It's very busy but we love it. There's always good craic on the bus and we are starving for our dinner when we get back to school.







The Cornstore youth club opened its doors in September 2001 with a fresh-faced Michelle Magee as youth tutor and 80 members.

The last 22 years have witnessed many changes – staff have come and gone and the Cornstore has moved out of the building that gave it its name. January 2022 marked the opening of the brand new Cornstore building leased to St. Colm's by Workspace. However, one thing has remained consistent – the unwavering and constantly creative leadership of Miss Magee, now Mrs Belaid.

Cornstore is the epicentre of activities for the young people of Ballinsacreen and surrounding areas. It serves the local community, and in turn, the community has offered steady support to the leadership and membership of the Youth Club – now totalling in excess of 200!
